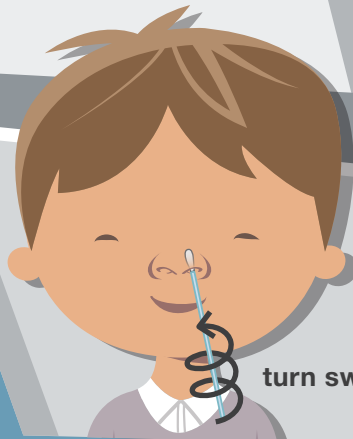

The phlebotomist will use a long swab to collect your sample and test you for coronavirus. You might notice that it looks a lot like the cotton swabs your parents use to clean your ears.

First, the phlebotomist will put the swab in one side of your nose and swirl it around, for about 10 seconds. Don't worry, it shouldn't hurt but it might tickle a little!

Then the phlebotomist will put the swab in the other side of your nose and do the same thing.
